6. Quotation Marks ("")

Use for direct speech or titles. Don't use for emphasis.

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7. Colon (:) and Semicolon (;)

Colon introduces, semicolon connects related ideas or complex lists.

8. Dash (--) and Hyphen (-)

Hyphens link words; em dashes insert dramatic pauses.

Bonus: Ellipses (...) and Parentheses ()

Ellipses show trailing thoughts. Parentheses add side info.

Punctuation doesn't have to be painful. With a little attention and practice, you can master it -- one comma, one period, one em dash at a time.
